

I am Wanted, I am Needed

On Twitter the American Printing House for the Blind ([APH@APHfortheBlind](https://twitter.com/APHfortheBlind) May 14) shared the visit of OSERS Assistant Secretary Johnny Collet and the following quote from him:

"As we think about improving academic achievement and outcomes for students With disabilities, we must talk about both high expectations and appropriate supports ... "

BRAVO! I could not agree with him more. I think I will write him a personal letter telling him that the Chicago Public High Schools emphasize that: I ***do not do*** exactly the opposite of what I am doing now.

As a totally blind student, when I wanted to participate in PE classes I was assigned to sit with an assistant teacher, who would read to me and teach me all about Health and Fitness. I was furious, and so was my mother! It took me more than 30 years, with the support of my mother, to prove that the educators did me ***very wrong***. I was well accepted and integrated by swim coaches at the Leaning Tower YMCA, starting at age 3.

I am now a member of a U.S. Masters Swim Team totally integrated. I am considered like

What do I have to give to my team? I helped my team to earn points at the recent 2018 Short Course Illinois State Championship Swim Meet held on April 13-15, 2018, in Musters, IL. But I feel that I gave my team members so much more than points and an applause. I feel that I gave them the awareness of what Albert Einstein said: **Only a life lived for others is a life worth living.**

I am not a fast swimmer, but I am not the slowest either. At the State Meet hardly anyone paid attention that I was blind. I just felt happy to be part of it all and have fun with my friends. That made me the happiest.

Let us live up to the highest American ideal: **The belief that we are all worthy; we are all equal and we all count.**

Empowered to Work With Your Visually Impaired Child's Medical Professional

You + your child's ophthalmologist + the pediatrician + any necessary therapists + medical specialists who manage any chronic or acute problems = your child's robust medical professional team.

You are a key member. Yet, it isn't uncommon for parents to feel void of expertise and, therefore, to take a passive role or back seat in medical evaluations and interventions. I'm here to remind you that your child and his or her medical personnel need you, whether or not the need is acknowledged, as you are the expert on your child and the voice for your (young or nonverbal) child. The team needs

you to remain informed, to advocate for your child's needs, and oftentimes to educate them about blindness or a visual impairment. **READ THE REST AT: www.familyconnect.org**

Scholarship Application Available

The Chicago Department Family & Support Services is accepting applications for the 2018 Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Scholarship program. The CSBG Scholarship program provides financial assistance to low-income students enrolled in post-secondary educational programs.

Students who are enrolled full-time in an Illinois college, university or vocational/certificate program by September 15, 2018 may qualify for a scholarship, which can range from \$500 to \$3,000. Funds may be applied to tuition, books, uniforms and fees related to the individual's course of study. Recipients must have primary residence in the City of Chicago and meet income guidelines.

We would appreciate your sharing this information with individuals and organizations in your community. We have attached an informational flier about the scholarship program which you can use on your website and in your newsletter, for posting in your office, and for distribution at events.

ISBE special inquiry panel finds broad systemic special education violations by the Chicago Public Schools

On April 16, the special Inquiry Team appointed by the Illinois State Board of Education, in response to a complaint filed by 14 advocacy organizations and attorneys, including Matt Cohen and Associates, issued its findings. The panel agreed with virtually every allegation raised by the Advocacy Groups, finding the following:

1. The CPS computerized IEP system was confusing, inadequate training had been provided on its use, and it led to automatic blocks which led to decisions being recorded that were different than the decisions reached by IEP teams;
2. CPS imposed excessive data requirements that elevated the presence and quantity of numeric data and minimized the importance of qualitative data, created unreasonable burdens on staff and delayed and denied provision of important services such as provision of 1-1 aides, Extended School Year, transportation and therapeutic day school placements;
3. Requirements for Principal or District Representative review of data and agreement with team decisions led to services being

delay and denied and improperly preempted the decision-making authority of the IEP teams and the ability of parents to have meaningful participation in the process;

4. The CPS process for developing and implementing its policy manuals led to confusion and was carried out without transparency and without adequate notice to parents and staff or training of parents and staff; and
5. The CPS budget process, including the decision to require principals to fill budget shortfalls from their own school budgets and the use of a budget appeal process that did not adequately assure that staff/funds were available to implement the services provided for in students' IEPs resulted in delays and denial of services.

The Advocate Group proposed extensive remedies, including:

- the appointment of a special monitor for a period of 5 years,
- mandatory revision of all CPS policies and procedures and the CPS computerized IEP system, with input from parents, teachers and advocates;
- revision of the CPS data procedures to reduce the time and amount of data required to make various IEP decisions and to allow for consideration of qualitative data and team input regardless of the quantity of numeric data obtained;
- Revised procedures for the role of the Principal and District Representative to assure that the IEP team is empowered to make decisions and that the proper personnel are actually at the meetings;
- New training plans and requirements to assure that all staff are aware of the special education procedures and follow appropriate process and compliance with procedural requirements;

- Revision of the CPS budget process to assure that adequate staff is provided to carry out all services provided for in every student's IEP;
- A \$10,000,000 fund to pay for compensatory services for students that suffered educational harm by virtue of CPS' policies and procedures that resulted in delays and denial of services to students that should have received them;
- \$1,500,000 in additional funding to independent not-for-profit parent groups to fund parent training and advocacy efforts to insure that parents are aware of these changes and are able to assure that their children are getting the services that they need.

What is happening now:

The State Board of Education is scheduled to meet on May 16th to receive the recommendations of the ISBE General Counsel and to discuss what action to take in response to the Panel's findings. We are concerned that the State Board may not take sufficiently strong action to force compliance by CPS, to monitor the compliance, and to provide compensatory services for those children injured by CPS' illegal actions. Our concern is heightened by the statements and actions of CPS since the findings were issued, including claiming that the problems have been or are being remedied already (without input from parents, teachers or advocates), taking credit for the initiation of the investigation and launching a parent advisory group through a secretive selection process that managed to exclude parents that had been active in pursuing the complaint.


